
I hope to see you all on Visitors Day.

Gesher L'Atid: Campaign Update

\$40 000 Raised!

Last July, we launched Phase 2 of Gesher L'Atid / Bridge to the Future, the capital campaign marking the camp's 50th anniversary. A number of Gesher families have made significant donations to raise \$25,000 for our new cabin. We are very grateful for their incredible support, the wonderful \$10,000 gift from Issie Lyon and

the generous \$4500 grant from the Grinspoon Foundation.

One of our most impressive gifts came from one of our young alumni who is originally from Kitchener. Michael Grossman, 25, a mining engineer in training, gave the camp a gift of \$1000 and he has

even pledged an additional \$800 (See page 6).

We have raised close to \$40,000, but we're not done yet. We need another \$20,000 to complete construction on the new cabin. We are now in Phase 3 of the campaign. If you have not had the opportunity to participate in Gesher L'Atid, we are asking you to give what you can.

Our scholarship fund, year-round education programs, seminars, dues to Habonim Dror, full-time shaliach, and the camp's physical maintenance are all significant expenses which we bear out of our budget. Gesher must rely on donations for capital projects, which is why we need parents, alumni, and the parents of alumni to support our renewal projects.

We are asking all our Gesher families, past and present, to make donations that reflect their amazing time at camp. Your gift of \$360, \$180 or anything that you can

contribute (monthly donations are possible) will help ensure that the next generation of new campers and families will also be able to benefit from the special Gesher experience.

A big thank you to Liat Papular for organizing such a successful Open Mic Night at the Pilot Tavern. This recent alumni event raised

\$1000 for Gesher L'Atid.



Alumnae Profile: Meet Michael Grossman



Education: B.Sc. Mining Engineering, Queens University

Occupation: Mining Engineer in training for Vale (one of the world

largest mining companies)

Residence since 2011: Thompson, MB (800 km north of Winnipeg)

Family: Michael grew up in Kitchener, ON. He's the youngest of 3 brothers: Jonathan, 28, is a public policy advisor in Ottawa. Aaron, 30, is a Toronto lawyer

Camp History: 2000-2009. Michael started at camp at 11. He went on

MBI and was on tzevet for 2 years.

Aspects of camp that were particularly important for him

Friendship: "I've made a lot of lifelong friends at camp. They're all over and I'm still in contact with them. Even the friends I'm not in contact with regularly, I feel quite comfortable calling when the opportunity arises."

Community: "Camp teaches you to be a part of a community. When you're in your camp kvutzah (group) you have to learn to get along. You become close with everybody. It's the same as growing up in a small Jewish community like Kitchener."

Strengthening Character: "Many of the activities at camp build character. Luxuries aren't part of the package. As a member of the camp community you clean toilets, you take out the garbage. Those kinds of activities build character."

Camp imparts important values: "The educational programming at camp helped me develop into the kind of person I wanted to be. The camp focuses on tikkun olam which is so important, because the idea of giving becomes a part of you."

Michael's explanation for why he made a significant donation to camp

"I wanted to make sure that future generations of kids get to have the same experience that I had and learn the same values as I did. I want to see the camp thrive and I intend to keep donating to the camp. My money has to go somewhere.

"We grew up in a small Jewish community. When you're from a small community you learn to become an active participant. If you wanted to attend synagogue you had to build it yourself. You have to make the effort. You have to help.

"My brother Aaron is a participant. He's on the board. If were in Toronto I would be able to participate more in the affairs of the camp, but right now that's not possible. I know I can help out by making a donation."
